Honoring Andrew C. "Skip" Hove, Jr.

Andrew C. "Skip" Hove, Jr., holds a place of honor in the FDIC's 86-year history and a place of affection in the hearts of the FDIC family. Best known simply as Skip, he served for more than a decade as the FDIC's first Vice Chairman and as its longest-serving Acting Chairman. A Nebraska native who brought to the FDIC three decades as a community banker, Skip was nominated by President George H.W. Bush and sworn in as a Board member on July 23, 1990, against the backdrop of the banking and savings and loan crises. As Vice Chairman, Skip quickly won the respect, admiration, and trust of his colleagues on the Board and of the larger FDIC community. His common-sense and knowledgeable perspective as a community banker was a valued addition to FDIC decisions and policymaking.

Skip's thoughtful and decisive leadership became even more essential when he served as the FDIC's Acting Chairman during three critical periods. Perhaps most significantly, he stepped into the role in August 1992 after the sudden death of former Chairman William Taylor, His calm and steady demeanor helped employees through a traumatic loss. Meanwhile, he guided the FDIC from the perilous depths of the dual crises to recovery, promoting stability in the financial services industry. Under his resolute leadership, the Bank Insurance Fund emerged from the red into a positive balance.

During his tenure, Skip pioneered many FDIC initiatives and programs and implemented many reforms. But what most endeared Skip to his colleagues was his small-town affability—his custom of greeting everyone, usually by first name, and with genuine interest. At lunchtime, he regularly joined employees in the cafeteria for friendly conversation and the latest updates on the University of Nebraska Cornhuskers, the football team of his alma mater. He was often described as a "man of the neonle"

Skip was a man of integrity, honesty, decency, generosity, modesty, and kindness—virtues he exemplified in his many roles as naval aviator, civic leader, community banker, and FDIC Vice Chairman and Acting Chairman. He was dedicated to community and country, but above all, he was devoted to family.

Skip retired from the FDIC in January 2001, but his legacy endures. On June 16, 2003, Skip returned to the FDIC for a happy occasion. In honor of his years of service, the FDIC was dedicating an auditorium at Virginia Square in his name. It was a joyful event with three generations of the Hove family in attendance. The choice of the date—the FDIC's 70th anniversary—could not have been more perfect. And as on that bright summer day, Skip Hove lives in fondest memory, as a colleague, a friend, a guide, and an inspiration to light the way forward.
